

Alumni, students, faculty, staff and other Concord family and friends gathered on the "Campus Beautiful" to cheer on the Mountain Lions, reacquaint, reconnect, and enjoy food, fun and music.

A 4 p.m. kickoff on June O. Shott Field at Callaghan Stadium pitted Concord against the Seton Hill Griffins. The Mountain Lions roared a loud and clear 52-34 homecoming victory at the final buzzer.

Concord University President Dr. Gregory F. Aloia and Interim Vice President for Student Affairs Marjie Flanigan crowned homecoming royalty in a halftime coronation ceremony. The 2009 Homecoming King and Queen were Curtis Hill from Princeton representing Pi Kappa Phi and Rachel Lucas from Newport, VA representing Alpha Sigma Alpha. First runners-up were Danny Pinkelton Jr. from Ansted representing Chi Omega Psi and Nicole Coleman from Shady Spring representing Sigma Sigma Sigma. Second runners-up were Andre Bown from East Liverpool, Ohio representing Mu Xi Phi and Ashley Davis from Ansted representing Delta Zeta.

A busy agenda preceded the game including dedication of the new Mountain Lion locker room, an all Greek luncheon and a cheerleader reunion. Alumni groups, the Concord Veterans Office, and other campus organizations sponsored tailgates. Reunion football players from 1959 and 1984 and All-Americans were recognized in a pre-game ceremony.

Admissions Website Rates An "A"

The Office of Admissions website received an "A"! The website has been recognized as among the most highly rated in the country in the 11th annual My College Options® Enrollment Power Index® (EPI), an analysis of all four-year college and university websites. MyCollegeOptions.org is the nation's largest online college planning program. Each year the program conducts a research-based analysis that measures how well college and university websites provide information to prospective students to assist them through the application process. The study grades over 3,000 institutions on a 100-point scale, including functionality, design and technology components.

English Students Present Essays

Concord English major Lorien Anderson and Student Government President Jeffrey Yeager accompanied Professor Gabriel Rieger recently to represent Concord University at the Ohio Valley Shakespeare Conference at Ohio University in Athens, Ohio. Both students, under the direction of Professor Rieger, submitted their respective essays for consideration in the M. Rick Smith Memorial Undergraduate Student Essay Prize. Ms. Anderson's essay, entitled *Psychoanalysis and Point of View in Zeffirellis Hamlet* was judged the winning essay in what proved to be a very competitive field. Both Ms. Anderson and President Yeager participated actively in the conference and gave an excellent representation of Concord University generally, and the Division of Languages and Literatures, specifically.

CU Achieves Highest CPA Exam Passing Rate

Concord University recently achieved the highest CPA (Certified Public Accountant) exam pass rate of all institutions in West Virginia. Of the four sections of the exam, Financial Accounting and Reporting (FAR), Auditing and Attestation (AUD), Regulation (REG), and Business Environment and Concepts (BEC), 52.94 percent of graduates of Concord University who attempted the exam passed all parts of the exam. Of these candidates, 70 percent passed the FAR section, 54 percent passed the AUD section, 54 percent passed the REG section, and 62 percent passed the BEC section. Concord University was the only institution in the state to have over half of their candidates pass the exam.

Sammons Receives Award

The 2009 Bea N. Orr Student Award was recently awarded to Sarah Beth Sammons (Health and PE). She was selected as Student of the Year at the WVAHPERD (West Virginia Association for Health, Physical Education, Recreation, and Dance) Conference & Convention. Sammons is pursuing a Bachelor of Science degree in Physical Education and Health Education. She will graduate in December, 2009. Sammons has been on the Dean's List for eight semesters and has a GPA of 3.89. She has been the recipient of the Student Activities Scholarship, the Director's Scholarship and the Woodrow Wilson Quest II Scholarship. She is also a member of the Alpha Chi National Honor Society. Her activities include serving as President of the Human Performance Organization Club, the Concord University Majors Club, a member of the Raleigh County School Wellness Committee, a Coordinator of the Concord University Community Activity Day, a presenter at the WVAHPERD Convention, and a member of WVAHPERD and AAHPERD.

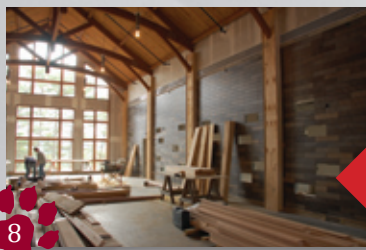

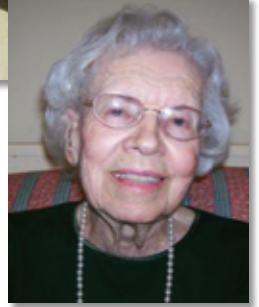

Chalfant shares fond memories of Concord

With lovely penmanship and a storyteller voice 94-year-old Jessie Mae Lilly Chalfant recently penned a delightful letter to the Concord University Office of Advancement. The correspondence was an R.S.V.P. for a University event filled with Mrs. Chalfant's personal memories of college and career.

After graduating from high school in 1933, Jessie Mae attended Concord and began teaching in 1935 at just 20 years of age.

Dancing through the lines of her handwritten note are images of a determined young woman with aspirations of becoming a teacher. Jessie Mae recounts how getting to her college classes was an adventure in itself, a daily journey over Mercer County's mountainous country roads in all kinds of West Virginia weather. Finding time for homework was another challenge. Her love of teaching shines through as she tells of her early years as an elementary school teacher in the coal camps of neighboring McDowell County. Praise and admiration for her alma mater are evident as she speaks of participating in commencement ceremonies at Concord.



Her letter follows: "My brother, Stanley Lilly, and I were both students at Concord. We were living at Camp Creek, WV, and drove from there to Athens. We also picked up two more students along the way. At that time, Concord offered a Standard Normal Degree, which enabled a student to teach in Elementary School. I proudly wore a cap and gown, and received my diploma. In the winter, we left home before daylight, and returned after dark, which meant 'burning the midnight oil' to study.

"I taught fourth grade in the small coal camp of Premier, WV. My 'homeroom' was fourth grade, but I also taught English in fifth grade, and geography in sixth. After I was married I taught third grade in another 'camp' called Mohegan. The children were so well behaved it made teaching a pleasure. My brother went on to receive an A.B. degree and taught Chemistry and Physics at Gary High School. Our area is fortunate to have Concord University in our midst."

In a later telephone conversation, Mrs. Chalfant shared more of her story. More than 75 years beyond her Concord days, the excitement and determination still shine through. And, so does the impact of the daily commute from Camp Creek to Athens and back.

"It was a tough way of getting an education. It was rough in the winter. We had to stay up late to do our homework," she said. "When we had to leave home in the wintertime, it wasn't even daylight. It was almost bedtime when we got home. That didn't leave you a lot of time to study."

But in the long run, she readily agrees, all the effort was worth it. "I wouldn't take anything for those days," she said. "I'm so glad I did it." She was rewarded by being surrounded by a classroom full of youngsters. "They were the nicest, sweetest little children," she recalls.

Mrs. Chalfant has fond recollections of the "Campus Beautiful" in the 1930s. "It was a pretty campus, so much smaller than compared to Concord now," she said. "About a year ago we drove all around the campus," she said of a return visit to her alma mater.

Mrs. Chalfant and her late husband, John Chalfant, were married for 60 years. She has two daughters, four granddaughters, eight great-grandchildren, and four step great-grandchildren.

After 94 years in the mountains, Mrs. Chalfant recently moved from Princeton to be near her daughter, Mary Lynne Huggins, in Charlotte, NC. She continues to share her gift of letter writing with friends and family from her new home.

Concord University education propels Myers' career
