
Athletic Training (AT) licensure is required in 46 states and the District of Columbia. Regulation of the AT profession is maintained at the state level. Four states do not regulate the profession with liscensure (California, Hawaii, South Carolina and New York). California has no regulation for athletic trainers. South Carolina, and New York require athletic trainers to be certifed within the state. Hawaii requies athletic trainers to register. Regardless of state regulation (licensure, certification or registration) national certification is required to meet regulation standards.

Students who graduate from a CAATE -accredited athletic training program are qualifed to take the national certification exam, offered by the Board of Certification (BOC). The Concord University MSAT is fully accredited by CAATE, with current accreditation granted through 2028. Once an indivual has passed the BOC examination and submitted required documents verifying graduation from a CAATE accredited program and current Cardiac Care certification, the individual will be granted the credentials of ATC. The ATC can then apply for licensure in the state or states of their choosing. There is no AT licensure reciprocity currently in place. AT's must follow the state regulation standards for the state in which they are employed.

While graduates of the Concord University MSAT do not directly receive AT licensure, the program prepares them to meet licensure requirements in all states in which licensure is required.
